BELO HORIZONTE, Brazil (LBM) – Louisiana Baptists returning from Belo Horizonte, Brazil, are sharing testimonies of widespread revival in churches, communities, prisons and schools, following an 8-day schedule of crusades, medical ministries and other outreach efforts in this South American country.

Wayne Jenkins, director of evangelism and church growth for the Louisiana Baptist Convention, said there were a recorded 3,202 salvation decisions resulting from events conducted July 10-17, bookended by overnight flights between the two continents, July 8-9 and 18-19.

## **Burl Cain to export Angola** seminary program to Brazil

BELO HORIZONTE, Brazil (LBM) – Burl Cain is thankful for how God is directing his path.

Cain, who recently retired after serving 21 years as warden of the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola, told the *Baptist Message* a plan is unfolding for his life that he did not anticipate when he left his career in state corrections especially after returning from his visit to Brazil.

"Wayne Jenkins asked me whether I had the passion to duplicate in Brazil what we were able to do at Angola with the seminary program we established there through New **Orleans Baptist Theological** 

Seminary," Cain said.

"I went with a lot of uncertainty about what I might accomplish with only a few contacts and just a little bit of time to be in the country," he said. "I was astonished how fast things developed after I arrived."

Cain said he was overwhelmed how God arranged for him to meet with the key authorities needed to move forward with a proposal to establish a four-year degree program in a Brazilian federal prison.

He said he was able to make a presentation to the director general of prisons, the warden of the correctional facility, the director of education programs for prisons and leaders of the Brazilian Baptist Seminary which will be a partner.

"I showed a video of prisoners preaching and told them about how violence had been reduced so dramatically after we implemented the program, and they were ready to sign on," he described.

He said he is going back in September with Jimmy Dukes, NOBTS senior professor of New Testament Greek and director of prison programs, to start putting together a plan.

"We have ten states in our country that are pursuing similar programs, efforts underway in Kenya and El Salvador, and now Brazil - all coming out of Angola because Louisiana Baptists invested in the lives of the men there," Cain shared.

Cain said he also presented information about the "Malachi Dads" program they developed at Angola. "It teaches inmates how to be dads and to 'rehabilitate' their sons, so they don't end up in prison,"

#### he said.

"I'm honored God dropped all this in my lap," Cain said in closing. "And I'm proud to be associated with Louisiana Baptists. They just don't know

all they are part of simply because they chose to support a prison ministry that God used to turn around one of the most violent corrections institutions in America."

## All-state choir ministers through more than song

ALEXANDRIA – Students of the Louisiana Baptist All-State Youth Choir spent the early part of this summer worshipping through song, sharing testimonies and reaching out to others.

Seventy-eight youth, representing 38 churches throughout the state, participated in a June trip to Tennessee accompanied by 10 adult sponsors. The choir sang praises to God and presented personal testimonies at youth detention centers, public parks, shelters, rescue missions, nursing homes, shopping malls and a few unexpected places.

Chris Turner, minister of music at First Baptist Church in Pineville, headed up the tour this year.

"The youth choir got to sing and help minister with a church in downtown Nashville that reaches out to the homeless under a bridge. It was a moving experience," Turner said.

He has participated in the choir tour for three years as a sponsor, but this year he oversaw the 10-day trip for Herb Armentrout, the LBC youth music consultant out of Broadmoor Baptist Church in Shreveport, who was unable to travel because of scheduled surgery.

The group made quite an impact in Tennessee, Turner said.

"This was not just a choir tour. The youth were given the opportunity to do mission projects, as well as be in the choir. They interacted with the people and shared Christ with them," Turner said.

Auditions for the All-State Choir, limited to students in grades 9-12 who have a recommendation from their music minister or pastor, begin in January.

The choir includes an 18-member ensemble group called "Everlasting Praise," which met for practice at the University of Louisiana at Monroe for a few days ahead of the entire all-state youth choir. After days of combined rehearsals, the choir departed the ULM campus and traveled to Chattanooga, Tenn.

Senior Morgan Crosser, Calhoun First Baptist Church, said this was her first year to participate in the choir and that the tour was "life-changing."

"The choir trip was the best experience. I've always struggled with talking to people. I'd get scared about what people thought of me – but, not on this trip. When we were at a men's rescue mission, I felt the confidence that Jesus can give you. I asked to share my testimony there, which is something I've never done before. But Jesus is something you can't be quiet about," Crosser enthused.

John Aaron Green, a junior from First Baptist Church in West Monroe, explained how participating in the choir tour the last two years has forced him to step out of his comfort zone with regard to sharing about his faith with others.

He said this was especially true when the group visited an open homeless shelter after being warned some people there might possess drugs or weapons.

"I was a little nervous, at first, when we were setting up the equipment. But when the choir started singing, I saw all these people raising their hands and clapping to our songs. I saw their hearts open up and saw the expression of worship on their faces. There was freedom. It was incredible," Green said.

Telling others about Jesus offers encouragement, Green added: "The more you share with others about Jesus, the more you want to share. It's a movement inside of you. We have an obligation to share, and I am unashamed."

## Louisiana Churches Horseshoe Drive to celebrate 'last service' before re-launch


ALEXANDRIA – Horseshoe Drive Baptist Church commemorated the dedication of its new worship center June 30, 1968, with a congregational photo, and interim Pastor Robert Daniel said he hopes for a reenactment Aug. 21 as members celebrate a "last service" in the recently renewed and updated facilities before re-launching as a revitalized congregation Sept. 18.

"This will be our final service as 'Horseshoe Drive Baptist Church' and we're going to treat it as a homecoming," said Daniel, director of missions for Central Louisiana Baptist Association. "We're inviting past members and leaders to come and celebrate our legacy, but also to rejoice in the future God is unfolding for us as a reborn family of faith."

He added that it is important to recognize all the impact the congregation has had as salt and light in Alexandria before it is reborn as a multisite campus of Philadelphia Baptist Church in Deville. "We'll have a time of food and fellowship Sunday morning in place of Bible study classes," he explained. "Worship services will include a message, but also a time to recognize pastors and longtime members who have contributed to this ministry since Nov. 16, 1958."

The 'final service" will serve as a point of closure, he explained, but also set the stage for the rebot of the congregation in the community.

Sept. 18, both campuses will be re-launched as Philadelphia Church but differenti-

ated by location – Philadelphia Church, Deville, and Philadelphia Church, Horseshoe Drive.

Daniel said the campus has received more than just a facelift in recent months in anticipation of the multisite service which will be inaugurated when the two congregations become one.

Pews have been reupholstered and refinished, and the front of the worship center has been redesigned, he said. The children's ministry area has been completely redone, and the fellowship hall received some needed upkeep.

Changing lives at Pine Ridge Baptist Church 'one family at a time' is what Kloee Martin and her husband Brett experienced.

During their first year of marriage they were on the verge of divorce.

However, hearing God's Word as Townley counseled them one on one, both Kloee and Brett declared Christ as Lord and Savior.

"When we were young, we did not know completely what this world versus what being saved from our sin meant," Kloee said. "We do now and we both were baptized July 17, 2016.

"With my son Rafe in my belly and my husband watching I was baptized, and I watched my husband Brett get baptized right after me. It was one of the best feelings," she said. "Praise the Lord!"

Like the Martins, Joe White's life took a turn in the right direction after an encounter with God at Pine Ridge.

For weeks Townley preached and for weeks God dealt with Joe, but he refused to take that step of faith.

While mowing his grass one afternoon, White finally stopped rejecting the Holy Spirit's conviction and definitively said 'yes' to Jesus.

#### **PRAYER FOR THE LOST**

The movement of God at Pine Ridge Baptist Church began a few years ago, when the pastor felt led to have old-fashioned prayer meetings Wednesday nights.

The men meet and pray together, so do the ladies and even the youth – all asking God to save souls.

Then they "put feet" to their prayers and go out weekly to tell people about Jesus.

Townley said revival has been spreading throughout the church and that has led to an awakening in the community.

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He said each week people are declaring their need for Christ and for baptism and Sunday morning attendance has grown.

When Townley became pastor in 1993, just a handful of members came on a typical Sunday. He said now attendance is about 300.

Townley said he is grateful his congregation sees the value in not settling for the status quo, and the importance of reaching out to people with the love of Christ.

"Here at Pine Ridge Baptist Church we are growing as a result of prayer, preaching and pursuing people with Jesus on a day-to-day basis," Townley said. "We have nothing to boast of but Jesus Christ and Him crucified and resurrected from the dead. It's His power in us that makes the difference!

'We desperately want God's Spirit to continually fill this place," he added, "and His people to reach the lost and make disciples."

Townley said his congregation's mission is simply to see sinners saved by the grace of God and then prayerfully discipled to follow Christ.

"I have seen first-hand that all around us there are people starving for truth and many are wanting to be saved but don't know how," he said. "Recently we have reached old and upward that have

with her son, Brent Johns, administrative and discipleship pastor at First Baptist Church in Houma, was one of several volunteers with the ophthalmology team who helped fit individuals with eyeglasses – matching right and left eye measurements for near and far vision, astigmatism, as well as reading clarity.

Johns said two older patients stood out in her mind.

A 72-year-old man had heard the Gospel several times during his visit to the eye clinic, and while waiting for Johns to find a pair of glasses which matched his vision needs, "he came under the conviction of the Holy Spirit" and began singing a hymn, Johns said. "He had fallen away from church for some time and I prayed with him to get right with God and get back into church."

During the Sunday night service he found me before the service to say "I am here," she added, and after the message, he went forward and "prayed to ask Christ to forgive his

Johns also told of a frail woman well past 80 years of age, who was almost blind and lived alone with her

"She was frequently falling because of her lack of vision and church members were worried about her, she said.

"We were able to find her some very strong prescription glasses," Johns recalled, "allowing her to see the top 3 lines on the eye chart and do close up reading. She came in unable to read at all and unable to see the chart. We were all very emotional when we saw that smile come on

#### Captives set free

Tamarah Wales, who was raised a First Baptist Church in Lafayette and is a member at Family Life Church, Lafayette, served as a member of the street evangelism team which had a unique prison visit.

Wales said they typically encounter "some difficulty" when they try to minister to inmates

"The warden and his assistant came out to talk to the team and just like at other facilities there was some reluctance to let us in," she explained "But during the course of the conversation, we had the opportunity to share the Gospel with them and both trusted Christ.

"After that they allowed us to go to every area of the prison to talk with the prisoners," Wales said, adding, "and the warden and his assistant led the way. We witnessed almost 300 salvation decisions that day!"

#### Bread of Life (& Gumbo)

June Charrier and Lisa Breaux conducted a unique cooking ministry while in Brazil.

Charrier, wife of church planter Louis Charrier, both members of Washington Baptist Church in Opelousas, and Breaux, a member of First Baptist Church in Lafayette, provided a gumbo meal as an enticement for influential individuals - who were unsaved and resistant to home visits or invitations to attend worship services – to hear the Gospel.

Charrier mentioned in particular the meal at First Baptist Church in Veneza where 30 people had gathered for what was billed as "a Louisiana specialty prepared by Americans.

"We cooked dinner and a dessert and shared a little bit about the history of gumbo and its origins with African slaves," she said.

"After the meal the people listened to a message on 'Who needs Jesus'," she continued, "and they were given a chance to repent of their sins and submit their hearts and lives to Jesus as Lord."

When the prayer ended, Charrier said she looked up and four men had been saved – a vice mayor, city attorney, well-known businessman and church "member" who had been the subject of many prayers by the congregation, according to the pastor

Breaux summed up for both of them the joy they take away from their cooking ministry.

"It reminds us a little gumbo goes a long way, even to eternity," she said






## **Feed the Hungry**

with fewer believers than cities in Saudi Arabia," Jenkins explained, and he challenged Louisiana Baptists to consider joining the 2017 team that



## LBF changes equity manager, reports budget savings, names a key hire

ALEXANDRIA -- The Louisiana Baptist Foundation Board of Trustees met at the Louisiana Baptist Building July 26 for their third quarterly meeting of the year with the morning dedicated to meetings by the investment committee and operating committee and the afternoon spent in general session by the entire body to consider committee reports and other business.

#### **INVESTMENT UPDATES**

Lafayette's Jim Prince, who chaired the morning meeting of the Investment Committee, called on Lee Morris of Graystone Consulting, the LBF's investment consultant, to give the quarter's update on the investment managers and market conditions.

Morris noted the following market conditions as considerations for the context of his report:

-- US domestic equity market was the only positive performer for the past 12 months. All others around the world were negative.

-- Entering 2016 analyst expectations were interest rates would rise and fixed income portfolios would struggle as a result. The opposite has happened. Rates have dropped and the fixed portfolios have delivered excellent returns.

-- After six years of underperformance versus developed markets, emerging markets are starting to deliver the best performance. The firm's Global Investment Committee thinks this may be the beginning of a long term move.

-- Reminded the board that the first year with a new president is historically difficult for the markets.

Morris reviewed the individual managers with the board and made the recommendation to terminate Snow Capital due to underperformance. The money under Snow's management would be allocated to other equity managers. The LBF employs a total of 19 managers in various segments of the markets.

The second quarter saw a decrease in net assets under management.

Barbara Bell, CPA and controller for the Foundation,

reported the outflows were a result of several larger entities withdrawing funds they had accumulated to use for projects this year. Assets under management as of June 30, 2016, were \$164,618,052, a decrease of approximately \$3.2 million for the quarter.

Investment returns for the major components of the LBF portfolio were reviewed by Jim Prince, who reported the following data for March 31, 2016:

-- Short Term Fund: 0.56% Annualized Yield -- Group Investment Fund,

comprised of various market sectors: 1.44% total return

-- Diversified Income Fund, conservative income-oriented fund: 2.90% total return.

The Investment Committee also approved management policies for the Convertible Securities Fund and the Managed Futures Fund. Both funds were added to diversify the overall portfolio of the LBF.

#### **OPERATIONS REPORT**

Columbia's John Carroll, chairman of the operating committee, reviewed the operating budget which continues to reflect a surplus through the first two quarters. Revenue was still ahead of expectations while expenses have been held in check. Jerry Love, planned giving director, reported on several new gifts received during the second quarter. Gifts for the period were mainly in the form of donor advised funds that will be used by the donors to direct gifts to a Baptist ministry. He also reported on the promotional strategy implemented earlier this year called Give-A-Gift.

The Foundation gives \$1,000 each month in 2016 to a Louisiana Baptist Church or ministry selected at random from submissions by Louisiana Baptists. The May and June recipients selected Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Philadelphia Baptist Church in Deville, respectively.

Several changes to the personnel manual were proposed, prompted by a review due to hiring a new employee, accord-

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
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people to hear the Gospel," Townley observed. "People need the Lord Jesus but how shall they hear if we don't tell them?"

#### **GREAT COMMISSION FOCUS**

Changed lives are a reflection of the Great Commission mindset and ministry focus of Pine Ridge Baptist Church, Townley explained.

For instance, he said this summer members began an initiative to feed local and state police.

Young children put together gift bags with their handprints painted on them and the phrase "these hands back the blue," he said. Already they have fed the entire Alexandria Police Department and are

working to do the same for the police force in Glenmora, the Rapides Parish Sheriff's Office and local Louisiana State Police units.

"If we want our communities to listen to what we have to say then we must gain their respect again," Townley said. "The way you get respect is you earn it.

'Sometimes we earn it by cooking or helping in whatever way our communities need, he said. "Once people know 'how much we care' then maybe they will 'care how much we know" Townley said, repeating a famous axiom of UCLA coach John Wooden who won 10 NCAA basketball championships using the philosophy.

"I thank God for a church family that is willing to get out there among real people in a

real world, pointing people to Jesus," he exclaimed. "If our churches don't bring the message outside the four walls of the building then churches will die and dying is no fun. 'Jesus came so that we

#### **GENERAL SESSION**

During the afternoon, Board President Julian Johnston of Calhoun led a review of the information presented by the Investment and Operating Committees in earlier sessions, and the board subsequently approved recommendations to terminate Snow Capital Management and reallocate assets with them to the other managers employed by the Foundation. Trustees also agreed to the personnel manual amendments.

The board also interviewed and approved the hiring of Chuck Murray of Alexandria as the new CPA and controller for the Foundation.

Taylor described Murray as having a strong background in accounting with experience in public utilities as well as healthcare and construction industries, and he said Murray would work alongside Barbara Bell, the current controller, until her retirement next year.
