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'Here for You' offers Louisiana Baptists a vast Gospel opportunity

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) – In a state where an estimated 60 percent of the population lacks a relationship with Christ, "Here for You" is helping to remind Louisiana Baptists that a great harvest awaits.

Launched in the summer of 2014 as part of the President's 2020 Commission, the "Here for You" multi-media campaign is attempting to impact the estimated 2.7 million people in Louisiana who do not know Christ.

At this point of our strategy, 'We are not waiting on the harvest,'" Louisiana Baptist commu-

nication director John Kyle told the *Baptist Message*. "The harvest is waiting on us!"

Since its statewide launch in 2019, "Here for You" has used social media, streaming services, broadcast television, billboards and more to reach the lost in Louisiana. The campaign has seeded God's truth through more than

31,000 views of the Gospel presentation and more than 2,100 searches for local churches.

Additionally, through a partnership with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, viewers have been directed to a customized landing page for prayer with trained counselors, who share the

WOODWORTH, La. (LBM) – During the Sept. 24 general session of the Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board, LBC Executive Director Steve Horn shared how Louisiana Baptists have continued reaching others for Christ.

FULFILLING THE GOSPEL

Horn said that various ministries are helping fulfill Louisiana Baptists' ministry purposes in three ways: seeking the lost, strengthening churches and supporting cooperative missions and ministries. In his report, he invited four individuals to share how Louisiana Baptists are fulfilling their mission through various ministries.

Executive Board approves loan to self-insurance trust

WOODWORTH, La. (LBM) – In response to the church insurance crisis that is pressing on congregations across the state, Executive Board members approved, during its Sept. 24 meeting, a motion that would loan \$250,000 from the Disaster Relief Restricted Fund to help cover initial costs of a newly-formed church self-insured organization.

The money would be used as a loan for establishment and administration of the self-insurance trust, also known as the Fellowship of Louisiana Churches and Non-Profit Religious Organizations.

"We have continued to take the lead to take steps so that this will become a reality," Loui-

And so, we praise the Lord for the work of Breakaway Camp and for the work of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and your employees."

Julie Johnston shared about the eternal impact of Champions Camp, held Sept. 6-8 at Tall Timbers Baptist Conference Center. This year's camp drew 23 individuals with special needs.

"So (have a ministry for those with special needs and their families) in your churches and let me tell you what will happen," she said. "Your blessing will be so much more if you make one thing accessible for one person. It makes a way for people to have access to Jesus."

GOLA VBS

Isabella McClendon, a student with Louisiana Christian University, recounted her recent experience as a team member with GOLA VBS, an effort that combines the missionary zeal of the state's Baptist Collegiate Ministries with a strategic need of Vacation Bible Schools for churches in Louisiana and beyond that might not otherwise be able to resource a VBS.

McClendon, who served as a missionary to Montana this summer, said the

children experienced joy after learning about Jesus. Her team also ministered to college students and participated in street evangelism.

Through that experience, McClendon stepped out of her comfort zone. While taking part in street evangelism, McClendon and her fellow team members embraced Galatians 1:10, which asks, "Do I seek the approval of God or man?"

'It didn't matter how many people blew us off or didn't want to talk about it," she said. "What really mattered to us was that we got to have conversations where we sat on the curb for an hour and were able to talk about the Gospel and share with people who were hurt, broken and confused about God. I learned to articulate my faith so much better, take that back to college with me and just have these conversations with students at my own campus."

Send Network Louisiana

Horn noted that the partnership with Send Network Louisiana began in August 2023, and for the reporting period of April-July 2024, network planters recorded 117 salvations, 72 baptisms, 1,892 Gospel conversations and 1,012 persons in intentional discipleship activity.

He added that 42 churches are supporting a church plant and 28 of those have chosen to be a sending church.

Matt Tyson, pastor with 3:18 Church, Shreveport, (named for Ephesians 3:18) shared how his church is reaching the "marginalized and unseen." He said they have drug dealers, prostitutes, mentally ill individuals and ex-convicts who are among the 85 to 115 who attend Saturday evening services. Tyson added that 60 people have

been discipled and 20 new converts have been baptized.

He said Louisiana Baptists are part of the story of 3:18 Church because of their continued giving through the Cooperative Program.

Because of your support, you're part of this story," he said. "As we move along, the unreached people group of the unseen are everywhere. They're all over our city. I can go to new cities as I travel and see the unseen in those cities. And so, they're all around us in our communities. They're all around us in our cities. They're all around us in our nation, and nowhere else will they find the joy of the love of Iesus."

siana Baptist Executive Director Steve Horn told Executive Board members. "I have met on many occasions, in person and in conference calls, with individuals in the insurance industry and government officials who can hopefully assist us."

BACKGROUND

In 2023 congregations began to receive nonrenewal notices or to see exorbitant premium hikes from the three largest insurers of faith-based organizations in the state (Church Mutual, Brotherhood Mutual and Guide-One). In response, the LBC launched a successful effort with the state legislature to establish a church self-insurance trust that is

open to congregations of all faith traditions.

Former state Sen. Robert Mills, with co-sponsor Sen. Katrina Jackson, championed Senate Bill 147, which was signed into law as Act 259, that authorizes churches and other faith-based organizations to form a self-insurance cooperative. There are no doctrinal components to the program and churches will not be tied to each other religiously. Each will be an individual member of the self-insurance trust, like a customer of any insurance company.

Gallagher Risk Management of Monroe has helped guide efforts to bring the program online, with a projected start-up date in the second quarter of 2025.

A state source of \$3 million of initial funding has been tentatively identified by Gov. Jeff Landry. These funds would cover costs

for catastrophic modeling and other steps needed to establish a premium schedule for participants. But the process for trans-

ferring the funds has yet to be determined.

Horn said there is an

\$500 million shortfall in the state's upcoming budget, but that this money (\$3 million) is not part of that discussion.

"The money that (Landy) has earmarked for us is already in a designated, restricted account." Horn said. "They might have different terminology than we have, but basically it is a designated account that is actually holding money that legislatures from years ago allocated to a very similar project to ours that has never materialized. And it's the recommendation of the commissioner of insurance to the

governor that that money is sitting there and can't be used for anything else, and so that makes us a prime target for it. So, I take that to be good news."

PRAYERS NEEDED

Horn asked for prayers as Louisiana Baptists and other faith-based organizations strive to help provide an alternative to traditional property and casualty insurance for cooperating churches.

"I ask your continued prayers and support as we try to make this idea a reality," he said.

EVALUATING THE FUTURE

Horn closed his report by sharing foundational, guiding Scripture passages that have been anchor points in his life for many years: Colossians 2:6, Psalm 71:18 and Revelation 19:6. He noted that Revelation 19:6 centers him in His walk with Christ, noting that the verse emphasizes that God reigns in all circumstances.


"No matter what happens in culture, He reigns," he said. "No matter what happens in the Southern Baptist Convention that I cannot control, He reigns. No matter what happens on November 5, He reigns."

Horn emphasized it is impossible to worry and worship at the same time. So when he begins to worry, Horn remembers he needs to worship the Lord a little more.

"This is how I wish to lead," he said. "This is how I want our pastors to lead. This is how I want our churches to lead.

"Let us be known for our walk, our witness and our worship," he continued. "And everything else will take care of itself."

JONESBORO, La. (LBM) – Craig James, associational missions strategist with North Central Baptist Association, will be nominated for the office of second vice president with the Louisiana Baptist Convention during the 2024 annual meeting of church messengers.

Clark Palmer, pastor with Faith Baptist Church, Tioga, contacted the *Baptist Message*, Sept. 25, to share his intention to make the nomination.

The yearly gathering of Louisiana Baptists is scheduled to be held in the facilities of Broadmoor Baptist Church, Shreveport, Nov. 12.

STATEMENT OF SUPPORT

James, who is a member of Atlanta Baptist Church, has faithfully served the Lord and churches for decades, Palmer said.

"Over the years when I mention his name I have found that his former church members love him," he said. "His fellow pastors love him. His family loves him. And recently the thought came into my mind, that I should nominate him for one of our LBC offices.

"If you know him you probably agree that he is a great representative of Louisiana Baptist pastors and leaders," he continued. "He was surprised when I asked him if I could do this but

agreed to allow me to nominate him as second vice-president when we gather in Shreveport in November."

BY THE NUMBERS

The database of the Annual Church Profile shows that Atlanta Baptist gave 0.16 percent (sixteen hundredths of a percent) of its undesignated gifts through the Cooperative Program to support cooperative missions and ministries this year, amounting to \$250 from undesignated receipts of \$155,988. The congregation supported the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering with a gift of \$545.

Atlanta Baptist averaged 86 in Sunday worship service and baptized

five new believers this year, which is above average in the Southern Baptist Convention for evangelistic effectiveness.

CANDIDATE'S RESPONSE

James told the *Baptist Message* he was honored to be nominated.

"After having served Louisiana Baptist for 34 years, I am humbled to be nominated for second vice-president of LBC," he said. "I have had the privilege to serve on Committee on Committee's, the LCU Board of Trustees and the Resolution Committee. I love our Louisiana Baptist churches, pastors and convention. I would be honored to serve our LBC and most of all serve my Lord and Savior. Iesus Christ."

James, who is married to Tammy, is a native of Verda and has served in the ministry since 1991.

He holds degrees from Louisiana College (now Louisiana Christian University), New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and the Caskey Divinity School (on the campus of NOBTS).

Wicker celebrates 55 years as pastor of FBC Slaughter

SLAUGHTER, La. (LBM) – Basil Wicker recently celebrated more than a half century of ministry with First Baptist Church, Slaughter.

During the church's 182nd anniversary service, Sept. 8, the congregation honored Wicker for his 55th year of service as pastor. The event featured messages by his nephews Mark Wicker and Blake Emfinger, both who serve on staff with churches in Mississippi. The church plans to name the new multi-purpose building that is under construction in honor of him.

For Wicker, the service was a reminder of a church and community that have held a special place in his heart since he preached his first sermon on July 21,

"It's been like a dream, a dream come true," Wicker told the Baptist Message. "The Lord's blessed me and

my wife. She is deceased. She and I did not have children, and my prayer was always that God give us children, and he did! My children were the children of the church, and that's my family.

'I'm totally committed to the to this body. We have always worked on building relationships and love for one another, and there's always something going on," he continued. "As for me, I've tried to keep things simple. I've not looked for greener pastures. God made me content where He put me and I'm grateful for where he put me."

A native of Jackson, Mississippi, Wicker surrendered to Christ when he was nine years old. When he was 12, he felt a call to ministry but because he was too shy, he waited two more years until he made a public statement to Calvary Baptist Church, Smithdale. Shortly after that he was given the chance to teach

a Sunday school class, which brought him off the sidelines and set the ministry.

After graduating from New Orleans Baptist Theogroundwork for training in logical Seminary, Wicker

accepted the call to his first pastorate -- with New Zion Baptist Church, Liberty, Mississippi. After one of the morning services, a search committee approached him about coming to FBCS.

Though he had never heard of Slaughter, Wicker and his wife, Linda, (who passed away in June 2019 and played the piano for 30 years with FBCS), came to the church for his trial sermon on July 21, 1969.

I had never heard of that community in my life, and I preached my sermon on the very day man walked on the moon for the first time," he said. One of the ladies told me she wanted to see that happen, and not to go too long with my sermon. We finished in plenty of time, and I was even able to make it home to watch the moonwalk with my wife."

Since he came to the church, Sept. 7, 1969, Wicker has seen the church grow from 100 in

Executive Board updated on CP, entities

WOODWORTH, La. (LBM) – During a Sept. 24 meeting, Louisiana Baptist Convention Executive Board members approved a reduced 2025 Cooperative Program giving plan and were updated on the ongoing work by the Convention's four entities.

BUDGET APPROVAL

Board members approved the business and finance committee's 2025 financial plan based on Cooperative Program contributions of \$17,380,808, a decrease of \$699,761, or 3.87 percent. Cooperative Program projections are based on actual receipts from August 2023 through July 2024. The allocation formula for distributing

CP gifts between Southern Baptist entities and Louisiana Baptist causes remains unchanged, 62.87 percent to support ministries in the state and 37.13 percent forwarded to fund national entities. The budget will be presented to messengers for approval during the 2024 LBC Annual Meeting, Nov. 12, in the facilities of Broadmoor Baptist Church, Shreveport.

Our conservative budgeting process frames our budget every year," Louisiana Baptist Associate Executive Director and Chief Financial Officer Dale Lingenfelter told the Baptist Message after the meeting. "Whatever we receive from August of the previous year (August 2023) through July of the current year (July 2024) becomes our working budget for the upcoming year. Every year has

its variables, but in short, our receipts within the outlined process were less than last year's receipts, thus the reduction.

"We know that individuals, and thus churches, are facing economic challenges due to the rising cost of basically everything," he continued. "We are grateful for the gifts the churches continue to forward, especially in light of these challenges. We're hopeful and prayerful that as the economy turns around and inflation eases, these gifts will increase as well."

ENTITY REPORTS

Louisiana Baptist Foundation Executive Director Jeff Steed said \$64.6 million has been generated for Louisiana Baptist ministries since the July 2020 launch of the LBF's Vision200 (an initiative to impact the Kingdom with \$200 million through the LBF in 20 years or less).

He added that for every budgeted Cooperative Program dollar given to the foundation this last budget year, \$35 was generated for the Kingdom.

Through the LBF's ChurchBiz services, the entity offers church loans, Giving-Gateway.net, payroll services, a computer support help line, capital

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campaigns, accounting services, short-term funds and online giving.

He also reminded board members that in honor of the Foundation's 80th anniversary, the entity is depositing an additional \$80 for churches and other ministries that open a money management account with the Foundation. Also, they will add \$80 when a donor makes a non-cash contribution through the Foundation's ministry to a church or other ministry. These opportunities will continue through the rest of the year as funds budgeted for these activities are avail-

"We would love to partner with your church in any way," Steed said in his report. "We are grateful to each of you for the honor to serve Louisiana Baptists to advance the Kingdom one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time."

Baptist Message Executive Editor Will Hall said the newspaper remains on solid ground financially, which helps the entity continue reporting good news taking place in Louisiana. He referenced recent articles that highlighted evangelistic efforts taking place in the state, such as how baptisms in 2024 increased by 31.1 percent compared to the year before and how Hopewell Baptist Church, Center Point, experienced a rebirth through prayer.

Hall said that HBC's pastor, Ricky Belgard, shared the article on his Facebook page and a grandmother, after reading the story to her 10-year-old granddaughter, led her to a relationship with Jesus.

"There is a Holy anoint-

ing going with that article to touch lives," Belgard wrote in his text to the *Baptist Message*. "Hallelujah!"

Hall, who also serves as the director of the Convention's Office of Public Policy, said Louisiana Baptists helped to pass some good bills but failed to defeat one in the recent state legislative session:

-- Although lawmakers handedly killed a recreational pot bill, they rejected legislation (Senate Bill 237) that would have banned THC from consumable products that are being pushed in convenience stores, local grocery markets and gas stations. Instead, they legalized recreational THC in a hemp bill (HB 952).

-- Act 676, championed by Rep. Dodie Horton, a member with First Baptist Church, Haughton, will place the Ten Commandments in every publicly funded classroom, kindergarten through college, in Louisiana.

-- Act 293, authored by Sen. Mark Abraham, a member with Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, allows "each city, parish, or other local public school board" to "employ or accept as a volunteer a certified chaplain to provide support, services and programs for students, staff, and parents."

Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries President and CEO Perry Hancock updated board members on several structural additions to its campus.

In August, the entity opened the Legacy Room, a space that celebrates 125 years of sharing Christ's

ANSWERING GOD'S CALL

First Baptist Church, Ferriday celebrates centennial

E4+ Conference: Be Spirit-led, Gospel-centered churches



PINEVILLE, La. (LBM) – The Church of today must look like the Church of the First Century that was Spiritled and Gospel-centered, Waylon Bailey, pastor with First Baptist Church, Covington, said during the recent E4+ Preaching Conference.

Citing Acts 2:22-41, Bailey told a crowd of more than 80 pastors and ministry staff and 17 pastors' wives at First Baptist Church, Pineville, that the church of today must tell the story of Jesus and live holy lives.

"What is the church of 2024?" he said. "It is the church that shares hope and that shares salvation in Christ. People are looking around and they want to know is there any hope in my life."

else for you to experience the peace, the love, the joy that I have found in Christ Jesus the Lord. And though my death is a lot closer than it has ever been, I also have great hope to be in the presence of God with the Savior who died for me. I

believe that is the church that will make a difference in the year 2024."

Bailey, sharing from Acts 4:1-22, added that when facing opposition and persecution, the church must respond by recognizing the opportunity in difficult times, deal with it in truth and facts, show how God works to bless lives, not shy away from the things of God and seek God's

Bailey noted that the words of Peter and John must be our words as well.

"Whether it is right in the sight of God to listen to you rather than to God, you must judge," he said. "We too must declare: 'We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20).

The Sept. 24 program was designed to "exemplify, encourage, equip and empower pastors to preach expositional sermons."

The conference also featured breakout sessions for pastors and directors of youth, media/sound, music and children, as well as ministers' wives.

Next year's conference, scheduled for Sept. 23, will feature Fred Luter, senior pastor with Franklin Avenue Baptist Church, New Orleans, his wife, Elizabeth, and his son, Chip, FABC senior associate pastor.

FBCP Pastor Stewart Holloway told the Baptist Message the E4+ Conference, now in its 16th year, began with a desire to sharpen and encourage pastors.

"I am thankful for our partners and sponsors that help E4 continue to minister to pastors, ministry wives, and ministry staff in our churches," he said.

Eight surrender to Christ during DR response

MORGAN CITY, La. (LBM) – Louisiana Baptist Disaster Relief teams recently wrapped up a fruitful month of ministry among residents impacted by Hurricane Francine as they reported eight individuals made decisions to follow Christ.

From Sept. 12-Oct. 5, team members prepared at First Baptist Church, Morgan City, more than 2,998 meals for residents. Teams also completed 231 chainsaw and mud-out jobs, presented the Gospel 72 times, handed out 50 Gospel tracts and distributed 45 Bibles.

Additionally, 4,890 meals were served by teams at Williams Boulevard Baptist Church, Kenner from Sept. 13-14.

Louisiana Baptist DR team members were assisted by teams from Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas.

Ron Johnson, a member with First Baptist Church, Loco, Oklahoma, serving on the Oklahoma Baptist DR team, led a woman to Christ while a mud-out team cleaned the inside of her home that was damaged by 18 inches of water.

Through the course of the conversation, Johnson presented the story of Nicodemus from John 3 and how the homeowner could turn to Christ.

"I shared how he was given the chance to have a new life in Christ and asked if she had done so," Johnson told the Baptist Message. "She prayed the prayer of salvation and was overjoyed."

Johnson said the encounter was a reminder of the ultimate reason DR team members serve.

"Our prayer has been that we serve others and act like children of God," he said. "The Holy Spirit gave us the boldness to share our faith.

"You never know who needs you to be the one who listens to them and offer encouragement through Christ," he said. "Even if you don't serve on a disaster relief team, remember God can use you, and if you feel led to tell others about Jesus, do so."

Elaine Crawford, who served alongside her husband, Steve, as members of the Oklahoma DR team, led three individuals to Christ. The most memorable moment was when she evangelized a young man who recently was released from prison.

"I felt an overwhelming presence of the Holy Spirit as I was talking with him and prayed with him as he turned to Jesus," said Crawford, a member with Sobol Baptist Church. "During our time there, it was evident that people were open and that

the harvest was plentiful.

"Jesus has sent us as his missionaries," she said. "He sends us to do the work that needs to be done, whether it's in a disaster or down the street in our own communities. I'm just proud to be a part of an organization that is so much bigger than me."

Francine made landfall as a Category 2 storm, Sept. 11, in Terrebonne Parish, about 30 miles southwest of Morgan City, according to the National Hurricane Center, and weakened to a Category 1 hurricane two hours after it moved inland.

The National Weather Service reported that 4-9 inches of rain had fallen across southeast Louisiana between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m., Sept. 11, prompting flash flood warnings to be issued for many areas. Recorded wind gusts include 97 mph in Dulac and 105 mph on Eugene Island. Nearly 400,000 customers in Louisiana were in the dark at one time

the Gospel. Such efforts have resulted in more than 4,300 Louisianians who have indicated decisions for Christ since 2019. Louisiana is the only state that has such a BGEA partnership.

Kyle said Louisiana
Baptists are finalizing a
plan in partnership with
the BGEA that will enable
Louisiana Baptist churches
to reach out to those who
have indicated a decision
for Christ in the state.

"There was a plan in place before COVID but, like many other plans during that season, those plans did not materialize," he explained. "The new plan will allow us to reach out to the people who have indicated a decision for Christ and have provided their contact information. We hope to have this operational before the end of the year."

Kyle said he is thankful for the campaign that has used money from the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering to "seed" God's truth with people and in places that Louisiana Baptists typically don't reach. Citing the parable of the seeds in Mark 4:26-29, Kyle said Louisiana Baptists have two jobs – to scatter the seeds and to gather the promised harvest.

'We've been doing and

will continue to do the first job – seeding – but we need to pray and challenge our people to gather the promised harvest," Kyle

love with children, their mothers and countless others around the state. The Legacy Room inside the Rucker-Austin Center features a chronological timeline of events and artifacts from its history.

In coming months, the LBCHFM will dedicate the Compassion Center, which will serve up to 25,000 impoverished children and their families each year. The regional center, still under construction, will provide weekend food backpacks and school supplies for children, a baby store for infants and toddlers and support for foster care families. The center also will provide space for a mission church, resources for existing compassion ministries and establishment of new churchbased compassion works.

He encouraged board members to become involved with the Connect-1Child foster care and adoption network, which in early September held a statewide conference at Calvary Baptist Church, Alexandria, for current and prospective adoption and foster care advocates along with church leaders and staff.

Hancock closed his report by sharing that in 2024 the entity ministered to more than 8,000 children, families and individuals in need. He explained that the entity continues to reach others with the Gospel through **Granberry Counseling** Centers, a residential program for ministers, a partnership with a Haitian children's village built by Louisiana Baptist and its campus in Monroe, and a women's learning center.

"Every Sunday, when you give to the Cooperative Program, you're helping all of those ministries and all those children because you're providing love and care," Hancock said. "It's the

hope in Christ that is making a difference."

Louisiana Christian University Acting President David Jeffreys said the fall semester is off to a "smooth" start.

He updated board members on the presidential search, sharing that a search firm and the search committee soon will look at resumes, with the goal of having a recommendation by February.

Recently, Jeffreys, other school leaders and trustees traveled throughout the state for town hall meetings to meet with alumni, pastors and others to field questions and update them on the presidential search and other happenings at the school.

He thanked board members for their support through the Cooperative Program and asked them to encourage prospective students to visit campus. "Point students and parents in our direction," he said. "That's one of the simplest things we can ask of you."

Louisiana Baptist Convention President David Goza (pastor, Jefferson Baptist Church, Baton Rouge) challenged board members to fight against Satan and his evil forces.

"We have a fight that we are required to be engaged in," Goza said. "But we have to learn to fight well."

Drawing from 1 Timothy 1:18-20, Goza said Christ followers must take the Gospel to the unbelieving world and fight with prayer.

"All these ministries highlighted today are for the purpose of winning souls in the Kingdom of Christ," he said. "We need to pray, be a people of evangelism, stand on the Word of God and point people to the truth of God's Word."

Credentials Committee: Messengers must register for annual meeting

ALEXANDRIA, La. (LBM) — In order for a church to be represented during the business portions of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, which will be hosted, Nov. 12, by Broadmoor Baptist Church, Shreveport, the congregation will need to elect messenger(s), who then must register and be certified by the Committee on Credentials.

LBC Credentials Committee Chairman Dale Sauls, minister to senior adults with First Baptist Church, Blanchard, noted to the Baptist Message that there are five ways for messengers to register and be approved:

— The first and simplest way is for messengers to pre-register using www.LaOne.org and print out the registration card to bring to the annual meeting. This way allows messengers to be certified within a matter of minutes, Sauls said.

— Second, a messenger may bring a note on official letterhead signed by the pastor or church clerk, stating that the individual was elected by the congregation.

— Third, a church officer can phone in the names of elected messengers.



"Ferriday has seen a lot of changes in my lifetime, and in the past 100 years. But one thing has remained constant," Beasley said. "The Word of God has been preached without compromise for the past 100 years at Ferriday First Baptist Church. God is great."

FBCF was founded after Dale Goodman, a Louisiana College student and pastor, had a strong desire to do mission work in the community. Soon after he began preaching, a revival service was held, and the church was formed on Sept. 14, 1924.

Through the years, the

church survived the Great Flood of 1927 that left its mark on the original structure, which is still visible today, as well as the Great Depression, World War II and the coronavirus pandemic. The congregation also completed multiple building additions on the property; and, most importantly, has baptized ore than 1,600 since it began.

"The church has a wonderful history and with God the future is filled with the hope of Christ," Ulmer said.

folks outside these walls, and especially that God would continue to give us a burning in our hearts for witnessing to the young people, young adults in Slaughter."



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

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
